The remains of the five Chinese victims who were killed in the terrorist attack on the Dasu hydropower project in Pakistan were brought back to China on a Pakistani military plane, escorted by Pakistani high-level officials and a working group from the Chinese Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Wang Wenbin said at a press conference. The five Chinese nationals and their Pakistani driver were killed in a suicide terrorist attack on March 26 at the China-invested Dasu hydropower project in Pakistan's Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

Although China may still be moving to a launch on warning posture, the full text of Xi's December 2012 speech, and the phrase it contains related to alert levels, reveals Xi did not discuss nuclear strategy or announce an intention to put Chinese nuclear forces on alert. He addresses more general concerns about the combat readiness, ideological orientation, and human qualities of Chinese military officers. Every Chinese head of state since 1842, when the United Kingdom defeated Imperial China in the Opium War, shared the same concerns. Xi did not say anything new, specific, or surprising. There is no language in his speech that justifies the suggestion he communicated aggressive new nuclear ambitions that day.

Majority of ASEAN people favor China over U.S., survey finds

Over half of Southeast Asians would now prefer to align with China over the U.S. if ASEAN were forced to choose between the rival superpowers, a regional survey by a Singapore-based think tank showed, reflecting Beijing's growing influence in the region. According to the State of Southeast Asia 2024 survey, compiled by the ISEAS-Yusof Ishak Institute, 50.5% of respondents opted for China and 49.5% preferred the U.S. if ASEAN had to pick sides -- the first time Beijing edged past Washington since the annual survey started asking the question in 2020. Last year's survey showed 38.9% preferred China and 61.1% chose the U.S.

Biden and Xi discuss TikTok, South China Sea and de-risking in call

U.S. President Joe Biden spoke with Chinese President Xi Jinping for nearly two hours on a range of topics including TikTok ownership, tensions in the South China Sea and whether American sanctions against China amounted to de-risking or decoupling. It was the first time since July 2022 that the two leaders spoke by phone. They have held two face-to-face meetings since then -- in Bali, Indonesia, during November 2022 and in California during November 2023. The call comes a week before Biden hosts Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida for an official visit to Washington. The two will be joined later by Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. for the first U.S.-Japan-Philippines trilateral summit.

These include restrictions on both the sale of high-end chips, concerning artificial intelligence and related areas, and chip making equipment, including extreme ultraviolet (EUV) lithography systems as well as many variants of them.

Online actors linked to the Chinese government are increasingly leveraging artificial intelligence to target voters in the U.S., Taiwan and elsewhere with disinformation, according to new cybersecurity research and U.S. officials. The Chinese-linked campaigns laundered false information through fake accounts on social-media platforms, seeking to identify divisive domestic political issues and potentially influence elections. The tactics identified in a new cyber-threat report published by Microsoft are among the first uncovered that directly tie the use of generative AI tools to a covert state-sponsored online influence operation against foreign voters. They also demonstrate more-advanced methods than previously seen.

Chinese scientists question 'flaw' in Nasa's hypersonic aerodynamics software

A research team in China says it has discovered a potentially fatal flaw in Nasa's hypersonic aerodynamics software. This small deficiency amid tangled equations could lead to "inevitably erroneous outcomes" when scientists simulate and analyse important issues, such as high-temperature ablation, said the team led by Professor Liu Jun, a researcher at the Hypersonic Technology Laboratory of the National University of Defence Technology, in a peer-reviewed paper published in the Chinese academic journal Acta Aerodynamica Sinica on March 14.

The PLA Navy Coastal Defense Missile Force

The People's Liberation Army Navy (PLAN) is comprised of five branches: the surface fleet, the submarine fleet, naval aviation, the marine corps, and coastal defense. As the PLAN modernizes, each of the branches has undergone its own modernization. This includes the PLAN Coastal Defense force (PLANCDF) which is primarily comprised of coastal artillery forces and coastal defense missile forces. Although the PLANCDF coastal artillery has become mostly obsolete, the missile component of this force or PLAN Coastal Defense Missile force (CDMF)) has not only been growing, but may play a critical role in many of the PLA's envisioned operations on China's periphery. The CDMF is comprised of anti-ship cruise missile (ASCM) systems and represents the shore-based medium and long-range fires that the PLAN brings to fights on the periphery of China. In the past decade, the CDMF has consistently undergone upgrades to its organization, the missile systems that it fields, and its barracks.

A warning to China? US plans to deploy medium-range missile launchers in the Asia-Pacific

Washington's deployment of ground-based launchers for its medium-range missiles in the Asia-Pacific region for the first time in nearly four decades is a "warning" to Beijing against military advancement and a conflict across the Taiwan Strait, according to analysts. Why Xi Jinping is meeting with Taiwan's ex-president
