Beijing sees forces bent on weakening it everywhere: embedded in multinational companies, infiltrating social media, circling naïve students. And it wants its people to see them, too. Chinese universities require faculty to take courses on protecting state secrets, even in departments like veterinary medicine. A kindergarten in the eastern city of Tianjin organized a meeting to teach staffers how to "understand and use" China's anti-espionage law. China's Ministry of State Security, a usually covert department that oversees the secret police and intelligence services, has even opened its first social media account, as part of what official news media described as an effort at increasing public engagement. Its first post: a call for a "whole of society mobilization" against espionage.

Head of China's top military court removed after just 8 months

The Standing Committee of the National People's Congress (NPC) voted on a group of personnel changes, including the removal of Cheng, it said in a statement without elaborating, after a meeting in Beijing. Cheng, a rear admiral in the PLA Navy, assumed the office of the president at the military court, the top court presiding

over the nation's defense forces, in December 2022, after being elected a member of the Central Commission for Discipline Inspection during the Communist Party's 20th National Congress in October last year.

Private company becomes first in China to launch rocket from sea

Galactic Energy, a rocket maker in Beijing, carried out the first sea-based launch mission by any Chinese private company. The satellites were built by Guodian Gaoke, a satellite operator in Beijing, and will be used to collect data for the internet of things, according to Galactic Energy. With the launch, the CERES 1 became the third Chinese rocket model — and the first made by a private company — capable of making liftoff both on land and at sea. Before it, China had performed five sea-based launches — four by the Long March 11 rocket and one by the Smart Dragon 3, which transported 37 satellites to their orbit. Both types are products of the China Academy of Launch Vehicle Technology, a subsidiary of the State-owned China Aerospace Science and Technology Corp.

A war-winning swarm missile will knock China out of Taiwan – fast

When analysts from the Center for Strategic and International Studies ran a series of war games simulating a Chinese invasion of Taiwan last year, they learned something surprising. The games indicated that the US Air Force, fighting nearly alone after the destruction of much of the US Navy, could almost single-handedly destroy the Chinese invasion force. The key to this simulated aerial victory was a missile: the Lockheed Martin-made Joint Air-to-Surface Strike Missile, or JASSM. It's a stealthy and highly accurate cruise missile that can range hundreds of miles from its launching warplane.

Disputes over South China Sea, North Korean missiles cast shadow on ASEAN summits

The 10-member Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) was holding separate summits with China, Japan, South Korea, the United States and Canada, providing an arena for big powers to lobby the bloc. China upset several ASEAN members last week when it released a new official map claiming sovereignty over the majority of the South China Sea. It sparked sharp rebukes from across the region, including Malaysia, Vietnam and the Philippines. But to avoid angering Beijing, experts said ASEAN leaders were unlikely to confront Li. "I predict... the leaders will avoid discussing confrontational issues such as China's new map," Aleksius Jemadu, a foreign affairs expert at Indonesia's Pelita Harapan University, told.

China rejected call to join Fukushima water framework

China has rejected Japan's proposal that it join an international verification framework for assessing the results of radiation level monitoring of treated water being released into the sea from the crippled Fukushima nuclear power plant, sources familiar with the bilateral relationship have said. China is staunchly opposed to the ocean discharge and has banned all seafood imports from Japan since it began in late August, calling the water "nuclear-contaminated." Beijing has also ignored Tokyo's repeated proposals for a science-based dialogue involving experts on the matter, Japanese officials said.

China isn't the only critic of Japan's discharge, but it is perhaps the loudest. China's foreign ministry called Japan "a saboteur of the ecological system and polluter of the global marine environment." And Chinese customs authorities banned all aquatic products coming from Japan since the wastewater release began on Aug. 24, despite being the biggest market for Japanese seafood exports before then. Reports of harassment of Japanese citizens in China soon followed. In reality, most scientists agree that the health effects of the wastewater on the marine environment and consumers of seafood from the region are negligible. Some observers have even pointed out that similar discharges have been occurring for years by operators of nuclear power plants across the world—including in China.

According to China's National Bureau of Statistics, about 56.3 million urban workers were employed by "state-owned units" in 2021. Those jobs commanded an average wage about 8% above the national urban average—an attractive segment for a company specializing in premium devices. And because Apple now ships roughly 230 million iPhones globally every year, 56 million would be a notable chunk to take out of the pool of potential buyers—especially in a mature global smartphone market with low growth prospects. The Wall Street Journal reported that the Chinese government is banning the iPhone and other foreign-branded devices from use by workers at central government agencies.

To meet the challenge of a rising China, the Australian Navy is taking two very different deep dives into advanced submarine technology. One is pricey and slow: For a new force of up to 13 nuclear-powered attack submarines, the Australian taxpayer will fork out an average of more than AUD\$28 billion (\$18 billion) apiece. The other is cheap and fast: launching three unmanned subs, powered by artificial intelligence, called Ghost Sharks. In this high-tech contest, seizing the upper hand across fields including AI and autonomous weapons, like Ghost Shark, could determine who comes out on top. If China wins out, it will be well placed to reshape the global political and economic order, by force if necessary, according to technology and military experts.

China sends remote-sensing satellite into preset orbit

With the new generation Long March-6A carrier rocket, China successfully launched a new remote sensing satellite, Yaogan-40, into a preset orbit to carry out electromagnetic environment detection and related technical tests. The Long March-6A carrier rocket, developed by the China Aerospace Science and Technology Corporation (CASC) 8th Academy, is a new generation of solid-liquid fuel bundled medium rocket. It can launch four tons into a 700-kilometer solar synchronous orbit.
