

Road and Tunnel Transformations Driving Growth and Connectivity in J&K

Plans Unveiled for 4 New World-Class Tourist Destinations with World Bank Support

he Government of India, in collaboration with the Jammu and Kashmir government, and the World Bank, is planning to develop four new tourism destinations: Kokernag (Anantnag), Baradari (Reasi), Bhadarwah (Doda), and Doodhpathri (Budgam), with world-class infrastructure. This initiative comes in response to an increase in tourist arrivals, with 1.2 million tourists visiting in the first half of 2024.

The World Bank's role will focus on knowledge sharing and promoting local handicrafts. Union Tourism Ministry officials said as far as Jammu and Kashmir is concerned, the focus would be on ecological sustainability.

The project is designed with a strategic vision, incorporating Tourism Destination Spatial Plans for well-organised growth. The tourism sector's contribution to Jammu and Kashmir's economy has grown from 7.84% in FY 2019-20 to 8.47% in FY 2022-23. The ongoing projects aim to further boost tourism, enhance infrastructure, and solidify the region as a premier destination for travellers. – *The Hindu*
