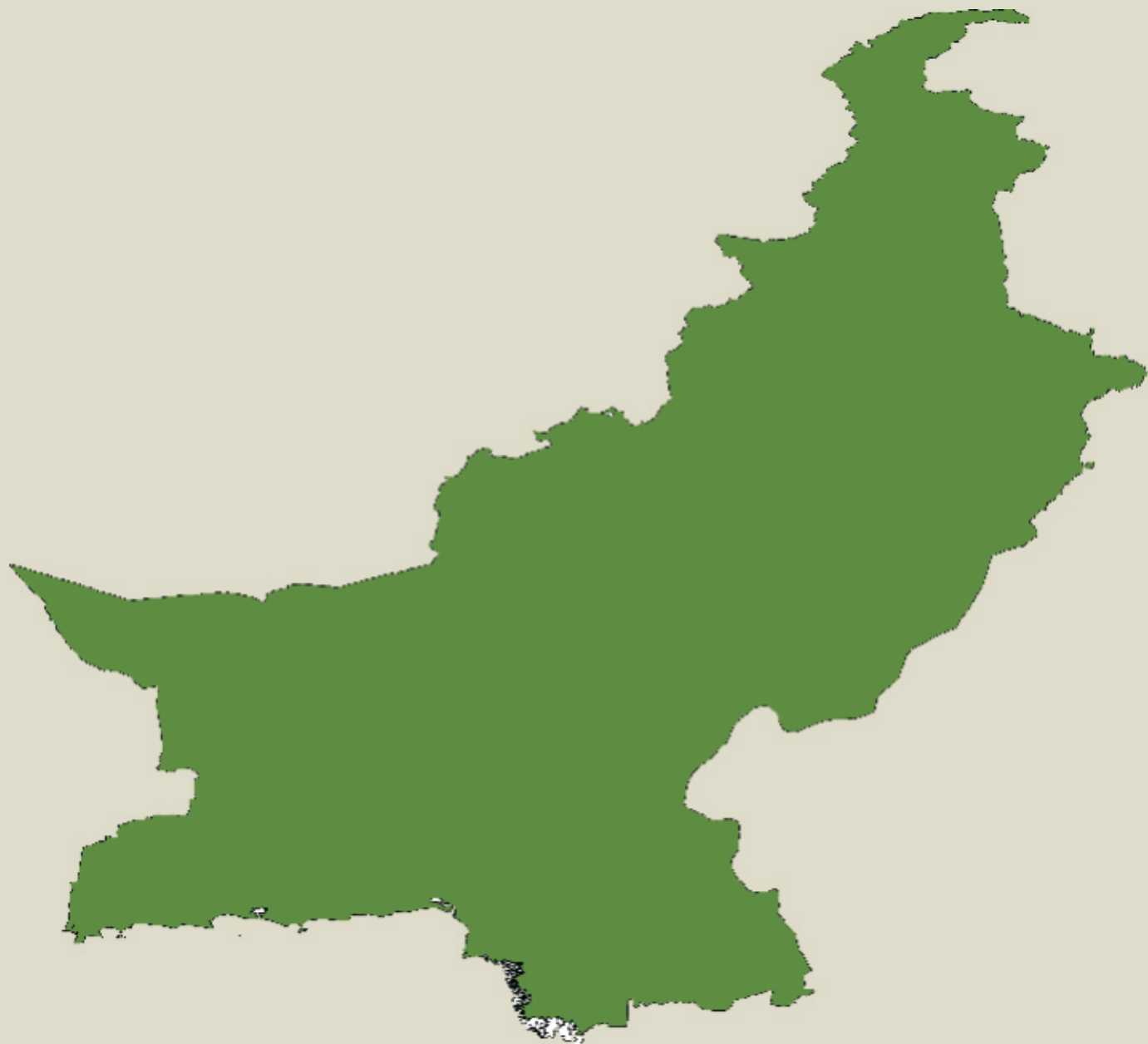

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## POLITICAL DEVELOPMENTS

### **Crisis to cannonade**, Editorial, *The Express Tribune*, 24 June<sup>1</sup>

As Israel and Iran trade fire to the extent of annihilation, Pakistan has come up with a categorical stance on the evolving warfare in the region. The National Security Committee, highest civil-military combine, yesterday reaffirmed Tehran's right to self-defence, and called for immediate cessation of hostilities. *The emergent session under Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif condemned Israel's acts of aggression, and feared that it could lead to catastrophic results. The committee was reportedly debriefed by the Army Chief Gen Asim Munir on the details of his meeting with President Donald Trump last week at the White House, as the session called for dialogue and diplomacy to tackle the situation in the Middle East. Islamabad has taken a leap forward in defusing the crisis as it joined Russia and China in tabling a draft resolution at the UN Security Council demanding ceasefire and protection of civilians.* The bombing of Iranian nuclear facilities by the US has circumvented all prospects of a negotiated solution, as Iran has vowed to avenge it in days to come by broadening the scope of retaliation. This is where some critical diplomacy and abject positioning is desired, and Pakistan is on the mark, sticking to a principled approach of non-violation of any state's territorial integrity. The crisis at hand, especially the attack on Iranian nuclear facilities, is a clear breach of International Law – an aspect castigated by the IAEA itself.

### **A ceasefire**, Editorial, *The News*, 25 June<sup>2</sup>

As of now, the ceasefire holds tenously, less a product of mutual understanding and more the result of one man's volatile diplomacy and a world increasingly fed up with US-Israeli aggression. There are also those who express frustration that while a ceasefire was brokered for Iran and Israel, the siege on Gaza continues unabated. The sentiment is morally justified. Iran, a sovereign nation with strategic capabilities, was able to force a pause through military deterrence; Gaza, under occupation and blockade, has no such leverage. *Yet this should not be an argument against the Iran-Israel ceasefire, but a compelling*

*call for a broader application of peace. Israel has gone beyond even its own levels of depravity which continues unchecked, largely due to unwavering American financial and military support. Without that support, Israel would struggle to maintain even its own defensive systems. This latest conflict has offered Iran a grim opportunity to demonstrate its resilience and military competence while also exposing Israel's overreach and overconfidence. The bloody nose it received from Tehran sent a clear message: Iran is not a passive target, and any assault will be met with a response. What happens next is critical. The ceasefire must be upheld, but it must also be a launching point for the international community Muslim nations, progressive democracies and neutral mediators alike -- to demand a comprehensive ceasefire that includes Gaza and holds Israel accountable under international law.* This should have happened right in October 2023 when Israel attacked Gaza. Now, this is a matter of survival for the whole world: Stop Israel.

**Diplomatic win, Editorial, *The News*, 26 June<sup>3</sup>**

In a time of escalating regional tensions and increasing global polarisation, the success of Pakistan's recent diplomatic initiative could not have been timelier or more telling. *Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif's praise for the high-level delegation led by former foreign minister Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari is not merely political nicety but a recognition of a rare, decisive moment where Pakistan's diplomacy outmanoeuvred India's traditional advantage in international perception.* Over an 11-day tour through key Western capitals, the Pakistani delegation delivered a powerful and consistent message: that India's aggression, its refusal to adhere to international norms and its provocative posturing in South Asia threaten regional and global stability. The response, both from diplomatic quarters and international media, was striking. In contrast to India's traditionally dominant narrative machinery, which often relies heavily on domestic amplification, Pakistan's message of peace, restraint and lawful conduct in the face of naked aggression found unexpected resonance abroad. *Today, Pakistan stands diplomatically vindicated. But the work is far from over. As the Modi government regroups, and as global attention inevitably shifts, Pakistan must maintain its narrative, consolidate its gains and keep pushing for international oversight of regional disputes.*

### Gaza ceasefire now, Editorial, *Dawn*, 26 June<sup>4</sup>

The ceasefire between Iran and Israel may have stopped the conflict from spiralling into a catastrophic regional war. *Now, similar diplomatic efforts are needed to end Israel's brutal slaughter in Gaza. For 12 days, ever since Israel attacked Iran, the world was glued to the battle, as any expansion in hostilities would have had seismic effects on the global geopolitical and economic order. Yet, despite its aggression against Iran, the regime in Tel Aviv continued the bloodshed in Gaza without pause.* Between late May and now, over 500 people have been killed in the occupied Palestinian territory, with many of the victims cruelly mowed down as they jostled for food in a Strip that is on the verge of starvation. As the spokesperson for the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights put it: "The Israeli military must stop shooting at people trying to get food." While speaking at the Nato summit in The Hague on Wednesday, US President Donald Trump said there was "great progress" on a Gaza ceasefire. *The Israel's Western supporters, who have shed crocodile tears for Iran's people and the repression real and imagined they have suffered under their rulers, apparently feel that the Palestinians, who have undergone far worse under the Israeli genocide, are unworthy of sympathy.* Hypocrisy is astounding.

### Minus Imran? Editorial, *The News*, 27 June<sup>5</sup>

*The passing of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's provincial budget for FY2025–26 has turned into an unflattering spectacle for the PTI, exposing the rather deep divisions within its ranks as well as the party's persistent inability to develop a coherent post-Imran strategy.* The controversy, triggered by the 'hasty' passage of the KP budget allegedly without the blessing of PTI founder Imran Khan, has spiralled into a theatre of the absurd. On one end, KP Chief Minister Ali Amin Gandapur has defended the move as a constitutional necessity to avert a crisis a position that is technically sound and politically unavoidable. On the other end, party stalwarts including General Secretary Salman Akram Raja and even Imran Khan's sister Aleema Khan have publicly disapproved of the move, claiming it undermines

Imran's authority and signals a creeping 'minus Imran' campaign. *The statement that "minus Imran has happened" is symbolically devastating for a party that has always presented itself as an extension of Imran Khan's persona. In a party where loyalty to the leader often supersedes institutional thinking, this remark perhaps was not the wisest move. But what's more troubling is what it reflects: a growing disconnect between the PTI's internal factions and an unwillingness to adapt to shifting political realities.* Whether one agrees with Gandapur or not, his core argument that passing a budget is not optional is difficult to dispute. No provincial government can afford to wait for a go-ahead from a jailed party leader when constitutional deadlines loom and threats of governor's rule hang in the air.

## SECURITY SITUATION

**Terror nexus, Editorial, *The Express Tribune*, 26 June<sup>6</sup>**

Pakistan has flagged an existential threat that it faces from a fugitive and outlawed organisation based in Afghanistan. The United Nations Security Council has once again been informed that Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan, the TTP, is freely operating from the West Asian state, and all efforts on the part of Islamabad to persuade the authorities in Kabul to move against them have fallen on deaf ears. *This past Tuesday, it was brought on record before the 15-member world body by Pakistan's envoy that the TTP is the largest UN-designated terrorist group operating from Afghan soil with an estimated strength of around 6,000 fighters, posing a direct threat to Pakistan's national security. The spike in terrorist activities inside Pakistan during the last two years is a case in point, and the TTP has now struck a nexus with other non-state actors including Al-Qaeda and Baloch militant groups.* The role of the US and the UNSC is essential if this simmering threat perception has to be dealt with in a sophisticated manner so that the evolving geo-economics is saved from waywardness. The mushrooming of terrorists, incidentally, has taken a new turn as India-backed proxies are

now raising their ugly head. The killing of 11 'khwarij' at the hands of security forces yesterday during intelligence-based operations in K-P amplifies the threat module, and is in need of being tackled lethally. This evolving trepidation must come to an end

**BLF seizes Levies police station in Quetta, seizes all weapons and sets up blockades in various areas, *Daily Sangar*, 24 June<sup>7</sup>**

*Gwahram Baloch, the spokesperson of the Balochistan Liberation Front (BLF) said in a press release that BLF accepted the attack carried out on the Levies police station in the Dasht area of Quetta. In the attack, the Sarmachars seized all weapons and took responsibility for the blockade in various areas. The spokesperson said that the BLF Sarmachars captured the Spezand Levies police station located in the Dasht area adjacent to Quetta at 7 pm on June 22, detained all the Levies personnel present there and seized all the government weapons from them. He said that a squad of Sarmachars set up a blockade in front of the Spezand police station on the Quetta-Sibi highway and checked vehicles. The Sarmachars also controlled the road connecting Dasht to Mastung and patrolled all areas, including the Omar Dhor area until 11 pm. He said that the blockade of important and sensitive highways like Quetta, Mastung, Nushki, taking over the Levies police station and seizing all the weapons is a manifestation of the successful operational strategy and strength of the BLF leaders. The statement said that the BLF accepts the responsibility of seizing the government weapons present in the Dasht Levies police station and reiterated the resolve that such attacks would continue targeting the occupying forces and their installations until the achievement of an independent Balochistan.*

*The two-hour lunch meeting between Pakistan's Field Marshal Syed Asim Munir and the President of the United States (US) Donald Trump at the White House recently is being described as an unprecedented and historic development in the global arena.* This meeting is considered to be of great importance not only in the context of Pakistan-US relations but also in the context of the region and Pakistan's internal politics, which has proven to be a major breakthrough in promoting cooperation between the two countries. During the meeting, Donald Trump described General Asim Munir as an influential figure and it was an honor for him to meet him; Field Marshal General Asim Munir thanked US President Donald Trump for playing a positive role in the recent Pakistan-India war and talked about Trump's possible role on the Indus Waters Treaty and the Kashmir issue. *Pakistan-US relations have always been subject to ups and downs in the past, but the recent meeting between Donald Trump and General Asim Munir has opened a new chapter of warmth in these relations. There is no doubt that Pakistan's success in the Indo-Pak war and India's retreat have highlighted Pakistan's strategic importance in the region on a global scale. Seeing Pakistan's success, there has also been a change in the American plan to make India the Chaudhry of the region,* Now US President Donald Trump is seeing Pakistan as an emerging power in the region, which is a welcome development for Pakistan. On the other hand, General Asim Munir's successes in the Indo-Pak war, his promotion to the rank of Field Marshal, and his growing popularity on a global scale have put him among the world's influential military leadership and he has emerged as Pakistan's most powerful figure on a global scale. Similarly, General Asim Munir's strong relations with China, Turkey, Saudi Arabia, and other Gulf countries have also highlighted his importance. *General Asim Munir's reception in the US and his meeting with US President Donald Trump have, on the one hand, disturbed Indian circles and the Indian media is criticizing this meeting. On the other hand, the meeting between Donald Trump and General Asim Munir is a slap in the face for the PTI leadership, which had hoped that the release of Imran Khan would be the top priority of the Trump administration once Donald Trump came to power. However, the PTI should remember that relations between countries are based on interests, not personalities.* The meeting

between Donald Trump and General Asim Munir is also important for Pakistan's defense. In recent days, the US has imposed sanctions on the National Defense Complex and several other companies associated with the ballistic missile program. The US also has reservations about Pakistan's purchase of defense equipment, while India is openly purchasing equipment from around the world for its missile program, but companies supplying equipment to the Indian missile program are exempt from US sanctions. *The US has never imposed such restrictions on India's missile program, which is a reflection of America's double standards. If the US wants to improve relations with Pakistan and be friendly, then the US will have to review its dual policy with Pakistan.* In the context of the changing situation in Afghanistan, the growing influence of China in the region and India's aggressive policies, direct contact between the US and the military leadership of Pakistan is of utmost importance. But in global politics, where unexpected meetings are considered important on the one hand, at times they also give rise to some misunderstandings. *It is important to see the meeting of General Asim Munir and Donald Trump in the context of relations with China, lest this meeting raise questions about Pakistan's partiality. China is a reliable friend of Pakistan, which generously helped Pakistan on the defense and diplomatic levels in the recent India-Pakistan war. Perhaps without China's help, winning the war with India would not have been so easy for Pakistan. There is a need for Pakistan's political and military leadership to visit China soon and convince Chinese officials that General Asim Munir's meeting with Donald Trump is a normal part of life and an effort to improve relations with the US will not have any negative impact on Pak-China friendship or CPEC.*

**A critical juncture for Pakistan, Atahar Qadir Hasan, Roznama Express, 25 June<sup>9</sup>**

The recent war between Iran and Israel has brought the Middle East to a perilous brink. This situation has become a cause of concern not only for regional countries but also for the international community. However, President Donald Trump has managed to bring an end to the war. The tension between Iran and Israel is not new; it has spanned several

decades. Both countries view each other as a threat to regional stability. Israel considers Iran's nuclear program and its increasing military presence in the region a serious challenge to its security. Meanwhile, Iran sees Israel as an occupying state responsible for the oppression of Palestinians. The recent conflict brought the region to the edge of a major confrontation. The United States, often seen as a "neighbour" to every country in the world, has further heightened concerns through its direct military aggression against Iran. *Pakistan, a key player in the region and a neighbour of Iran, could be directly affected by this tension. I spent last week abroad, where I met with members of the Pakistani diaspora. They are deeply concerned as they see the clouds of war gathering near Pakistan's borders, especially since global powers have frequently expressed their reservations about Pakistan's nuclear program.* Pakistanis fear that the shadow of this war might extend to their homeland. Pakistan has maintained nuclear deterrence to counter India's aggressive ambitions, and this nuclear capability has always been viewed with suspicion by global powers. In light of this, the pressing question is: how dangerous could this war become for Pakistan? Among the concerns of overseas Pakistanis and the international community, Pakistan's nuclear program remains a major point of focus. *Any large-scale regional conflict is bound to have repercussions for Pakistan. Although Pakistan has consistently advocated for peaceful relations with its neighbours and has expressed support for Iran in this conflict, any escalation of war would inevitably lead to increased regional instability. In such a scenario, Pakistan would come under intense international pressure. This would be a significant challenge for the country. At this delicate time, Pakistan's political and military leadership has shown wisdom and adopted a policy that has shielded the nation from the raging flames of war. Pakistan has always supported peace and stability in the Middle East. Historically, Pakistan shares strong fraternal ties with Iran. In this context, adopting a balanced and cautious strategy is crucial. Pakistan could play a mediating role to help prevent further escalation. Pakistan's diplomatic ties with Iran and major global powers place it in a unique position to pave the way for a peaceful resolution. Leveraging its important status in the Islamic world, Pakistan can be a strong voice within the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC), advocating for a complete end to hostilities and the start of peaceful dialogue*

### Is Iran Upset With Pakistan? & US Attack on Iran: what it means, *Talk Shock* with Azaz Syed, 24 June<sup>10</sup>

In the ongoing conflict between Iran and Israel, the US has now jumped in and is playing an active role. US bombed three cities of Iran with its powerful bombs and now after this development the UN and the European Union has called for ceasefire between the conflicting nations. The host also pointed out that Russia and some other countries have criticised the US attack and in the meanwhile the price of oil has grown up on the international front. **Mushed Hussain** pointed out that both Israel and India has been thrashed m one by Iran and another by India. **Pakistan, Afghanistan ties on edge after North Waziristan attack, Kamran Yusuf Vlog, 30 June<sup>12</sup>**

In the latest episode, journalist Kamran Yusuf discussed two key issues. He began by highlighting the strained Pakistan-Afghanistan relations following a suicide bombing in North Waziristan on June 28, 2025. The attack, claimed by the Hafiz Gul Bahadur faction of the TTP, targeted a military convoy in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's North Waziristan district near the Afghan border. It killed 13 Pakistani soldiers and injured over two dozen people, including children, when the explosion caused nearby houses to collapse. This was

one of the deadliest single-day attacks on Pakistani security forces in recent months, underscoring the TTP's growing audacity. Yusuf noted that a suicide bomber rammed an explosive-laden vehicle into the convoy, destroying a security outpost and seizing military equipment. The attack followed a pattern of TTP operations, with similar incidents in South Waziristan and other areas of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. Although Pakistan's government and security establishment have not officially commented on who supported the attack, Yusuf suggested that suspicion points toward Afghanistan due to the involvement of TTP-aligned groups. He mentioned that this was the first major suicide bombing in some time and that Afghanistan had recently declared it would not allow TTP cadres to operate from its soil. Yusuf added that Pakistan-Afghanistan relations had improved in recent months, with China playing a key role in convincing the Taliban to prevent their territory from being used as a terrorist launching pad against neighboring countries. A trilateral meeting involving Pakistan, Afghanistan, and China was held in Beijing to this end. The Taliban not only assured that their soil would not be used to support terrorism against neighbors but also began relocating TTP cadres from the Afghanistan-Pakistan border regions to areas deeper inside Afghanistan, in addition to arresting several such individuals. Yusuf also referenced Pakistan's Army Chief, Field Marshal Asim Munir, who, during a recent visit to the United States and in speeches at various think tanks, stated that since the Taliban came to power in Kabul, attacks within Pakistan have intensified, and militant activities across the Durand Line have increased. Munir noted that Taliban numbers are growing as new cadres continue to join their ranks. He reiterated this stance during a meeting at GHQ, emphasizing Pakistan's desire for cordial relations with Afghanistan but warning that Afghanistan must stop sheltering Indian proxies targeting Pakistan. Munir stated that if Afghan soil is used against Pakistan, Pakistan would aggressively pursue its targets in Afghanistan. Yusuf further discussed deteriorating civilian relations between Pakistan and Afghanistan, exacerbated by Pakistan's expulsion of more than 100,000 Afghan migrants since 2024. He noted that the deadline for Afghan Citizen Card (ACC) holders to voluntarily leave Pakistan was March 31, 2025, as part of the second phase of Pakistan's Illegal Foreigners Repatriation Plan, launched in September 2023. However, enforcement of arrests and deportations was reportedly delayed until April 10, 2025, due to Eid al-Fitr holidays. For Afghans holding Proof of Registration (PoR) cards issued by the UNHCR, the deadline to remain in

Pakistan is June 30, 2025. Afghans awaiting third-country resettlement were also required to leave Islamabad and Rawalpindi. Over 1 million Afghans have been forcibly returned to Afghanistan in 2025, amid rising tensions with the Afghan Taliban over security concerns, including the North Waziristan attack. Yusuf added that many deported Afghans have been returning to Pakistan through clandestine routes. Kamran Yusuf further stated that Afghan migrants, including genuine ones, have long posed security concerns for Pakistan, as terrorists often hide under the guise of Afghan migrants. He noted that the recent Israel-Iran conflict highlighted the risk of foreign enemies using migrants, including those from Afghanistan, to target host countries from within. Yusuf mentioned that Iranian security forces have arrested several Afghans, along with Indians and Iranians, who were working for Israel. He suggested that this scenario serves as a learning curve for Pakistan to address the issue of illegal migrants in the country.
